Early learning at St. Mark Center from birth to age 5 drives kindergarten readiness and life success.

30-million-word gap: nowhere is the inequity between families of higher education more apparent than in the vocabularies of 4 year-olds.

These differences can be discerned in toddlers as young as 18 months. For children who grow up in a professional family, the average 4-year old accumulates 45 million words, versus 13 million words for a child in a family receiving welfare.

This pivotal period between infancy and 5 years is when our influences on physical, social, emotional, and cognitive development of a child matter most. At St. Mark Center, we focus this effort as much on parents and families, as we do our young students.

Though located in one of the city's poorest zip codes, St. Mark Center's beautiful, arts-infused environment, cultural diversity, and creative philosophy are attractive, as well, to families with far greater economic resources and educational backgrounds.

Our quality education and rich experiences in the arts, music, literature, and history are positioning students for what sound research has proven: children who receive quality early education are more likely to graduate from high school, less likely to become a teen parent, and twice as likely to attend college.

It is a philosophy that St. Mark Center lives enthusiastically, knowing that our work today is setting the course for the 21st century workplace and our broader world.

Project Approach is an innovative, authentic style of learning at St. Mark Center

f you happen to be touring St. Mark Center, only to see a fashion show in progress in one of our classrooms, there's a good reason: it is called Project Approach learning.

The Project Approach builds on natural curiosity, enabling children to interact, question, reflect and more. This authentic learning style extends beyond the classroom to teach students about the outside world. Made possible through the ABC² grant, an example of Project Approach learning is a recent clothing study. Teachers brought in books, fabrics, and a sewing machine, and a parent posed as a model. Other approaches have included baking, food and camera studies.

This learning style incorporates individualized learning. Even when a student is disinterested in the topic, teachers are encouraged to seek an aspect of the study that can loop in the student. For example, one student was the DJ for the fashion show despite his disinterest in the clothing study. In this way, the unique needs of each student are fulfilled, allowing quality and inclusive learning for all.
